



Native Hawaiians earn \$3,000 - \$27,000 per year less depending on industry

Why the wage gap?

Native Hawaiians are under-represented in Hawaii's largest industries



Native Hawaiians are under-represented in most of the highest-paying industries



Most high-wage industries have many workers with college degrees


Education Level of Hawaii-Born Populations






An education gap has persisted for at least <u>50 years</u>

Percent of Hawaii-Born Population that Stops at a High School Degree




Percent of Hawaii-Born Population that Stops at a High School Degree




Less education means lower wages

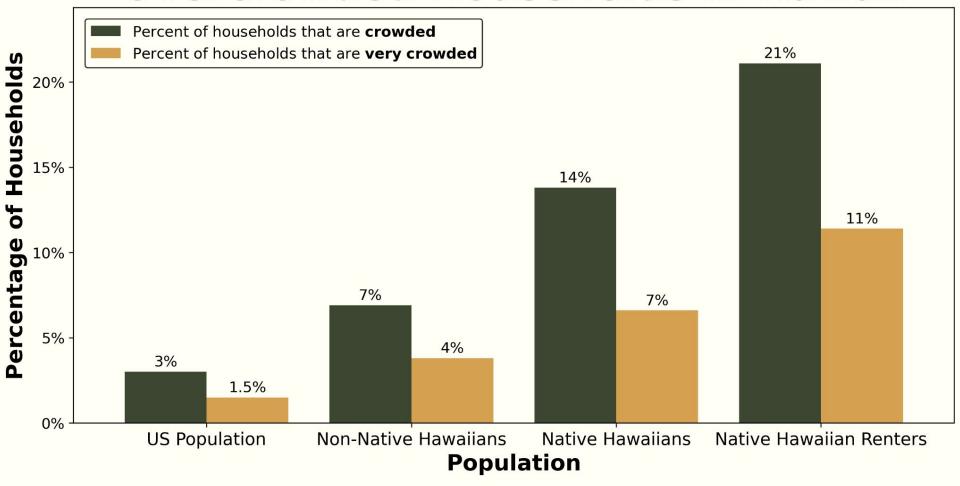

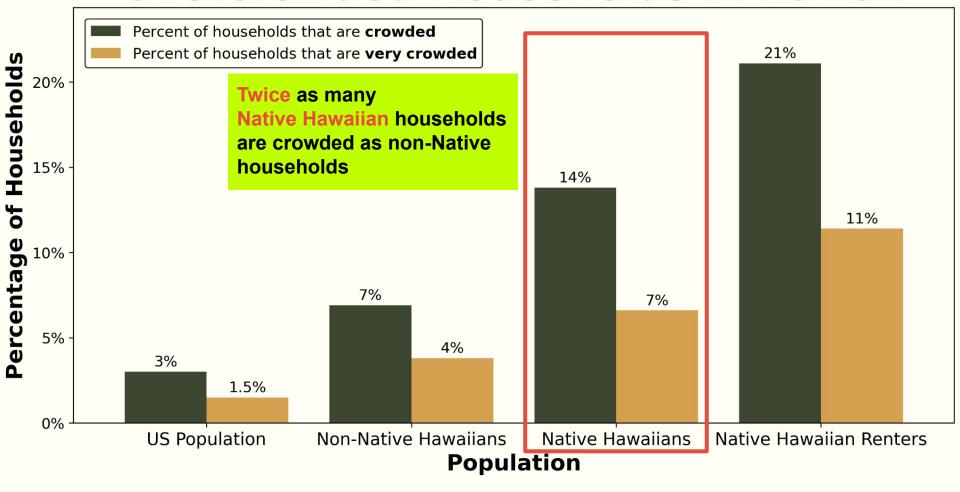

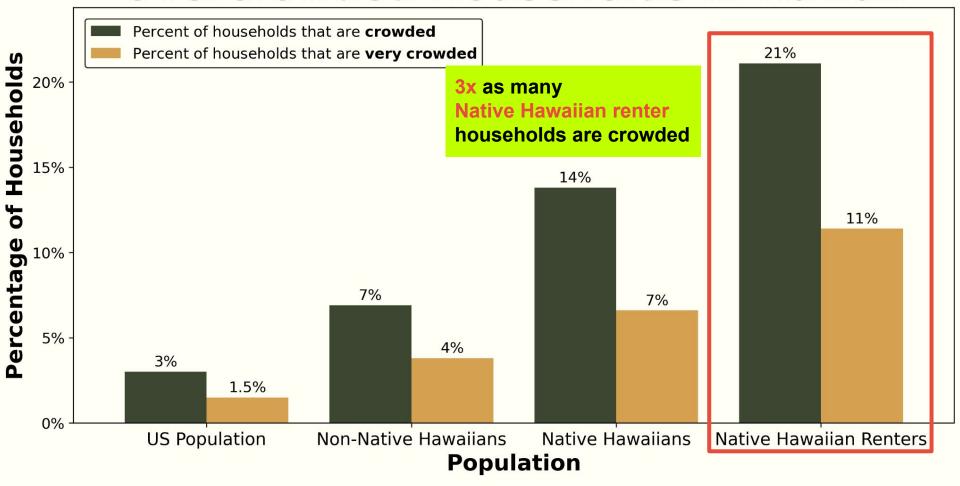
Native Hawaiians put more people into the same homes











15,700 Native Hawaiian households are *crowded*

15,700 Native Hawaiian households are *crowded*

7,500 Native Hawaiian households are *very crowded*

Naive Interpretation:
Hawaiian households want
to live as large families
sharing one space

Reality: Overcrowding is how many Native Hawaiians afford housing

For some Hawaiians, unaffordable and crowded housing isn't worth it






